Open Letter To LPOs

Dear Property Owner,
The Board Of Trustees is committed to improving Lakengren and fixing our community's infrastructure. In this tough economic time, and given our limited resources and rising operating costs, we have decided to look for other options for funding without having to ask the community for a raise in assessments at this time. We are challenged with providing all services of a community of our size and making the much-needed infrastructure repairs like roads and parks while staying within the current assessment level. Our goal is to find continuing long term funding to help reduce future increases in assessments. The first priority of the funding will be to complete the road project and

maintain an adequate road maintenance fund.

At the current time the BOT is exploring the possibility of a retail sales division that would operate a convenience drive thru. In order to take advantage of income from non-residents of Lakengren this business would be located to the west of the entrance on St Rt. 732. There are other lake communities in Ohio that have similar types of businesses already operating for the same purpose. This convenience store would offer many items our community members already purchases at other locations; but instead of the profits going to others those profits would now be used to improve our community. Items to be offered will include but not limited to milk, bread, eggs, charcoal, ice, beer, wine, bait, pop, chips, snacks, boat necessities and some household items.

We would like to make our money work for us. All the profits made from the

proposed business would benefit the community. When spending your money at the Lakengren owned store you would be investing in your community rather than creating profits that would benefit other people.

This proposal is not final. Gasper Township Precinct Two is currently a dry precinct (no alcohol sales). There is currently a petition being circulated to place an issue on the November general election ballot to change Gasper Two to a wet precinct. The Gasper Township Precinct Two is entirely located inside the Lakengren community. Converting Precinct Two is only the first step in the process.

Until we gather your input and approval this project will not be implemented. The Lakengren Board Of Trustees will schedule informational meetings to discuss this proposal. This proposal also will be discussed at the Annual Meeting of the membership. Afterwards, this proposal will go to a vote of the entire membership of Lakengren. Our goal as a board is to give you all the facts about this proposal. Then the Board would like to have a large amount of our membership to vote so we can make a decision based on what the entire community would like. 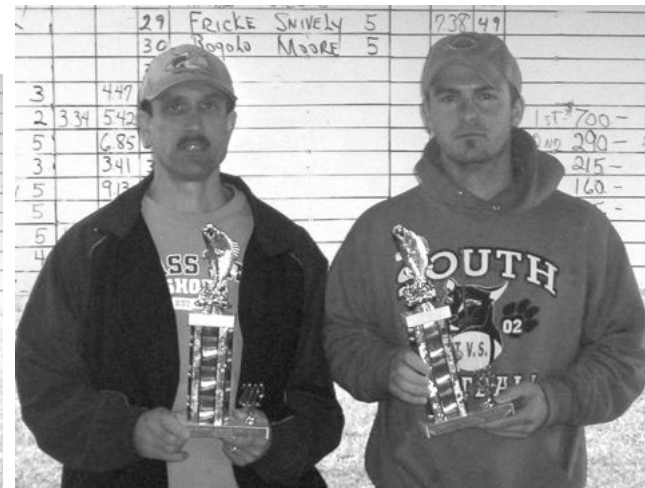

Here But Hidden: The Backstage Birds, Part 2

The Eastern Phoebe, like the Eastern Wood-Pewee featured last month, is a small, sparrow-sized flycatcher colored with subtlety; camouflaging its existence in the trees. Here but hidden, it is another backstage bird common in Lakengren. Brownish-gray on top, the Phoebe blends with tree limbs where the Pewee's olive-gray top blends more with the leaves. Both birds are white underneath looking like wisps of clouds when seen from below. Both birds also sport a vest of olive-gray. The Pewee's may have a hint of yellow and be a darker olive than the "wash" of the Phoebe, but all in all, they look very similar. In contrast, the Pewee has a spot of yellow on its lower mandible and 2 light wing bars, the Phoebe does not. The Phoebe's thin



bill is all black and its head, wings and tail are all dark gray. It has no spots, no streaks, no eye ring, no hints of yellow, actually no definite identifying marks at all, truly here but hidden in its plainness.

What the Phoebe does have is the unique quirky habit of wagging its tail, not like a dog wags its tail from side to side, but like a Phoebe wags, down and up. Maybe tail bobbing or tail pumping are better descriptors, but every birder I know uses the phrase "wagging its tail".

The Wood-Pewee resides midway up in the dense leafy canopy, whereas the Phoebe most often sings from the top of a dead branch lower in the tree - no more than 20 feet high - always wagging its tail. They coexist feeding on different strata of the insect world. The brownish-gray tail-wagger is a favorite of farmers because it eats vast quantities of lower flying pests that are more likely to attack crops and livestock. True to the flycatcher family, the Eastern Phoebe (the only phoebe found east of the Rockies) still catches insects in midair. From its low leafless perch, it will suddenly dart skyward, all a gray blur, abruptly stop to catch the unsuspecting insect and then slowly float back down to perch and sing and wag its tail some more. This typical flycatcher behavior is called "hawking". Yes, flycatchers hawk and birder's bird! It's funny how we tend to convert nouns to verbs!

While the Pewee is one of the last birds to come north in the spring, its cousin the Phoebe is one of the first, arriving early in March long before one would think there are enough active insects to feed even such a small bird. A full month before the Purple Martins, before there are even buds on the trees, this hardy flycatcher arrives to perch on leafless branches announcing his presence by clearly, emphatically repeating his name "fee-bee, fee-bee". Accenting the first syllable and rolling the second, he calls as frequently as 20-40 times per minute all the while wagging his tail.

Because they do come north so early and leave so late in November, Phoebe

populations often decline after severe cold weather occurs in early spring or late fall. Several years ago when Ohio saw temperatures not rising above freezing for over a week in late April, the loss of Purple Martins was well publicized. The loss of Phoebes, though unspoken outside of ornithological circles, was just as tragic. By arriving so early, nesting in May and chicks fledging in June, Phoebes compensate for loss by raising a second brood in August and September when other birds are already heading south. It is not unusual for Phoebes to stay in Ohio until the first killing frost of times as late as the end of November.



Unlike the Wood-Pewees, Phoebes do not nest in the trees they frequent. Instead, they build cup nests of moss and mud pellets and plaster them under the overhanging ledges of open cliffs, in ravines, or on the banks of streams, ponds, or lakes. In the modern world of man-made structures, one is just as likely to find them nesting under the eaves of a back porch or shed, on girders under bridges, on the walls of culverts or among the rafters of open farm buildings - as long as it is near water. They have an affinity for water. One nest was even reported attached to some abandoned farm machinery rusting near a pond in an overgrown field. The water

can be in woods or fields, parks or subdivisions. Even highway bridges over rivers can be home to this adaptive bird.

Audubon was the first to discover that Phoebes return to the same nest site year after year. By tying a silver thread around the leg of a Phoebe in one of the earliest known "banding" experiments, he found the silver-thread-legged bird nesting in the same exact spot several years in a row despite spending winters as far away as Mexico.

Once they nest and raise their young, Phoebes distance themselves from each other to lead single solitary lives. Neither flashy colors nor large flocks will call your attention to these hidden but here birds. A small silhouette perched on the top of a dead branch singing a clear "fee-bee" and wagging its tail is all one needs to identify the Eastern Phoebe.

One of those unseasonably cool July evenings when the AC was off and the windows open, I chanced to hear a Phoebe and a Wood-Pewee singing back and forth. A languid "pee-ah-wee?" from somewhere high in the leaves was answered by a clear "fee-bee" from lower in the bushes - a conversational descant over the tenor "cooing" of the Mourning Dove. They were accompanied by the monotone trill of a Chipping Sparrow, the percussive "chucks" of a Grackle, and the faint bass of a bullfrog. No radio or TV disturbed this symphony of the "sounds of silence". Take time to listen; you may hear it too!
