BOARD OF TRUSTEES - Regular Open Meeting August 9, 2010

Meeting was called to order at 7:00 pm at the LWA Meeting Room.

Present: Vice-President Deron McEldowney, Secretary Judy Preston, Treasurer Randy Blaich, Amy Gilbert, Matt Brueggemann, and Gerald Estes. Also present were Manager Kevin Thorpe, Office Manager Tammy Moore, Board Recorder Daphne Brunett and 12 visitors. Absent: President Paul Ellison, Asst. Treasurer Rick McMahan and Bill Hapner.

President's Remarks: Mr. McEldowney noted President Paul Ellison is on vacation. The trash pick-up service has received lots of good remarks. There will be a short executive session following the regular meeting.

10-08-117 Amy Gilbert made the motion to approve the July 12, 2010 Board minutes. Randy Blaich seconded. Motion approved.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Randy Blaich noted the following funds available as of August 9, 2010:

Mr. Blaich also stated 18 small claims were filed this week.

10-08-118 Amy Gilbert made the motion to approve the Treasurer's Report subject to audit. Judy Thaxton seconded. Motion approved.

LWA REPORT
LWA Treasurer Paul Reed brought a letter of information concerning the leachate line. The engineer will start laying plans for

the line which will follow the roadway and will not enter Lakengren. There will be an information meeting on August 18th at the Chamber of Commerce office at 6:30 pm.

MANAGER'S REPORT

Kevin Thorpe stated about \$3,000 has been spent this year to treat Thor and Valhalla lakes. Treatment seems to be going well and Valhalla Lake will receive another treatment for the green algae with REWARD at a cost of about \$1500. An individual has offered to allow use of their electric to run an aerator on the lake.

We are ready for roads to be paved and plans are to begin before the end of August. Bench ends and picnic tables have been made for the rec areas. The LWM is going well. Most people now know what days are for pick up. Trash deposits at the barn have slowed considerably.

A new Grasshopper mower was purchased. The old diesel grasshopper will be put up for bid as-is. The clutch was replaced on the New Holland tractor. Faces of some of the dams and banks started with Valhalla Lake by removing trees and debris. Some patching is needed on Valhalla spillway. Thor, Hammer, Kastrup and Bear lakes will all get some attention this month. Tar to patch the roads arrived Friday and that job will begin soon.

SHERIFF'S REPORT

Kevin Thorpe reported for Kevin Caplinger by stating the July and August were very quiet compared to last year. Deputy Caplinger has spent several hours, mostly at night, using the bike patrol. Several juveniles were caught past curfew. Patrol hours will be adjusted after school starts and special attention will be given to help control teens driving to school.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Viking Editorial Committee-Janet Davis noted the deadline for the September issue is August 20th.

Safety Committee-Gerald Estes noted that the

LWM Advisory Committee-Jan Weaver has been chosen for the committee chair.

In other Safety Committee business, it was discussed about getting a blue flasher light for the Patrol Boat so that Deputy Caplinger could use it for patrols. He would also need an extra boat key. Radios need to be purchased. The next meeting is August 19th at 5:00 pm.

Marine/Lakes Management Committee-The committee met August 5th. Thanks to all who helped with the Nigh Fishing tournament. The plaques vs. trophies was well accepted. Visitor Paul Healy voiced concern about the situation at Grand Lake St. Mary's. All concerns were addressed by Manager Kevin Thorpe and Chair Charlie Moore. Mr. Moore is submitting a statement to the Viking with a method to minimize the possibility of a similar situation at Lakengren. Visitor Mike Schleich voiced concern about the number of dead fish and an oily film on the water around his dock. A committee member stated the dead fish could be due to the extreme warm water and the oily film may be from a leaking boat motor. Mr. Moore reported on the price of fathead minnows. The committee will make a decision on how many and when to order at a later meeting. The committee worked on setting dates for next year's Open Bass tournaments which will be voted on at a later time. Next meeting is September 2nd at 7:00 at the Marina, weather permitting, or at the Lodge.

10-08-120 Randy Blaich made the motion to ban the use of spray fertilizer or use of phosphorous fertilizer as of January, 2011. Judy Thaxton seconded. Motion approved.

Finance Planning Committee-Tom Pohlbel reported they have looked at the facilities and have a better idea of what we have. The main issue is the roads. He explained a proposal that would provide for a loan of \$708,000.00 which would get the roads completed now. Other important items were the recreational activities, buildings, etc. Lack of

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- 2) what the leachate is and what it is not;
 - 3) backup and overflow risks to residences adjacent to sewer lines through which the leachate will flow once it enters the Lakengren system;
 - 4) the potential for odors from the leachate in Lakengren;
 - 5) potential risks to the Lakengren water supply;
 - 6) planned testing and safety measures within Lakengren;
 - 7) how the additional revenue received for treating the leachate might be used.
- The LWA is now reviewing the transcript of the meeting for comments and suggestions to be considered as the project continues.
- The LWA distributed the following fact sheet for the meeting. It is presented here for residents who were not able to attend.

LWA LEACHATE PROJECT FACT SHEET

Time Line

- * May 26, 1998 - Memorandum of Understanding with the Commissioners which states in item 6 that the "Grantee agrees that, provided the Grantor has the consent and approval of the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency, or its successor, It (Grantor) shall have the right to have the County Landfill Leachate treated by the sewer system at a mutually agreeable price, and as long as same causes no harm or injury to the sewer system".
- * September 8, 1998 - LWA purchases wastewater system including the treatment plant from the Preble County Commissioners.
- * 2000 - 2003 - Leachate issue addressed on

a number of occasions with no formal activity.

* March 24, 2009 - LWA approached by County to see if we would be interested in accepting leachate for treatment at our wastewater facility.

* April 17, 2009 - Initial discussions with County concerning leachate project.

* April 21, 2009 - LWA sends letter to Commissioners with the intent to accept leachate in accordance with the 1998 Memorandum of Agreement.

* July 22, 2009 - Commissioners inform LWA that RFPs (Request for Proposals) will be requested from interested parties for the acceptance of leachate from the County's landfill.

* August 28, 2009 - Request for Proposal received from Commissioners.

* September 1, 2009 - LWA retains Advanced Treatment Sciences, Inc to conduct a leachate treatability study.

* October 20, 2009 - Leachate treatability study completed reviewed with consultant.

* October 23, 2009 - Proposal for processing leachate generated at the Preble County Landfill submitted to Commissioners.

* November 25, 2009 - Commissioners score and accept LWA proposal.

* December 14, 2009 - LWA enters into negotiations with County on leachate contract.

* December 14, 2009 - LPOA issues letter to provide easement to MH #505.

* January 25, 2010 - Contract to accept leachate is signed by both parties.

* April 12, 2010 - LPOA passes on motion not to allow easement to MH#505.

* June 23, 2010 - Preble County Commis-

sioners contract with Choice One Engineering for leachate force main design.

Leachate Project Facts
* Leachate is not considered a hazardous or a toxic waste by the Ohio EPA

* Leachate from the County's landfill is much like any wastewater stream except for the high nitrogen load and total dissolved solids.

* Leachate is treatable in a typical secondary activated sludge system.

* The LWA wastewater treatment plant is a two stage secondary activated sludge system with UV disinfection.

* Leachate will enter our system at manhole #534 on Paint Creek Road.

* At manhole #534 the leachate will flow into an eight (8) inch gravity sewer main.

* At manhole #534 the leachate flow will combine with our normal wastewater stream, and then proceed to Lift Station #4. Leachate flow equals approximately 5.6% of flow here.

* Lift Station #4 will deliver flow up to Longman Rd to the treatment facility.

* The design treatment capacity of the wastewater treatment plant is 0.600 MGD.

* The current average flow at the facility is 0.300 MGD.

* With an average leachate flow @ 10,000 GPD (0.010 MGD), leachate flow equals 1.7% at design and 3.4% operating. Will require an additional 40 minutes of pumping time per day at Lift Station #4.

* Overflow elevation at Lift Station as compared to MH#534 shows a 37 foot elevation difference. Only point of overflow is at Lift Station #4.

* Contingencies at Lift Station #4 include; stand-by power, two control

point alarms for high level, visual alarm lights, auto dial system for alarm conditions, dual pump units, complete parts inventory in stock. Will be looking at SCA-DA system installation in the near future. In addition, pollution insurance coverage is being considered for specific locations in the system.

* The probability of leachate entering Lake Lakengren is just not there.

* The only residences that may experience backup issues are those who are located adjacent and/or downstream of MH#534. This condition is not new.

* Treatability study indicated that we can treat at controlled volumes up to 60,000 GPD.

* Contract with the County calls for adequate dissolved oxygen in leachate at point of entry to our system. This will stop sulfide production and odors that otherwise could occur.

* Contract with the County calls for leachate testing twice per year (February & August).

* County is required to deliver leachate in a treatable form. Any remediation would be at the County's expense at their location and/or our treatment facility.

* LWA testing is completed two times per week for BOD, NH3, & TSS. Other organics are tested monthly. Inorganics are tested quarterly. D.O., pH, & Temperatures are monitored daily. Sulfides will be added to our weekly schedule.

* Contract with the County calls for the flow of leachate to be controlled at an average rate of 10,000 GPD not to exceed 60,000 GPD for three consecutive days, or 4 days in one week, or twelve days in one month.

* Under any extraordinary condition the Con-

tract calls for immediate notification of the other party as to the condition and the length of time leachate flow would be terminated.

* All flow of leachate will be metered and transmitted to the treatment facility.

* All treated discharge is controlled by a permit issued by the OEPA since 1975.

* Discharge point is Sugar Creek then to Paint Creek.

* No impact on the well fields has been noted as a result of discharge from the wastewater treatment since 1975. We do not see any additional impact as a result of this project.

* Sugar Creek is 360 ft. from Well #3. None of our wells are in the 100 year flood plain.

* Length of current contract with Commis-

sioners is 20 years @ a fee of \$0.0299/gallon.

* Contract includes option to extend through post closure responsibilities of the Preble County Sanitary Landfill.

* What is in it for Lakengren? Will provide a revenue source estimated at more than \$110,000 year = \$2,200,000 over the next 20 years. This will keep sewer user rates down and provide funding for sewer projects needed in the future.

* Revenue source equals an estimated 40.1% increase in sewer user fees to the LWA.

* Rate studies show Lakengren's sewer rate currently is the lowest in Preble County and in the bottom five of all systems surveyed in southwest Ohio.

Home Gas Leak

On September 4th, our daughter and son-in-law noticed a gas smell when entering our back door.

Bob Spitler of Wood Propane came right over and checked the line. He found that there was gas movement even though no propane was being used.

Drake Heating and Air was called and Steve Chrismer's nephew, Cris Grider, responded immediately. He checked the crawl space and found that a brass fitting leading to the propane fireplace was cracked and leaking gas. He removed the fitting and capped the black metal pipe. He found our service line from the propane tank to the furnace was the preferred black iron steel pipe and that copper piping was used to the fireplace and to the kitchen stove.

Steve Chrismer came out Tuesday and arrangements were made to convert to black iron steel metal pipe. Some communities' codes do not allow copper pipe for gas lines because it is corrosive.

Since this leak was in the crawl space and the air vents are blocked, we are grateful that our house did not blow up as occurred in nearby Germantown years ago.

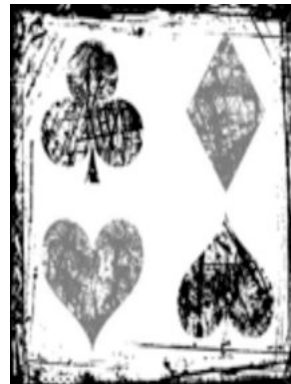

BATS

Yeah, I know. I know. Bats are not birds. But tell that to the bat that made a grand entrance at Richmond Civic Theater just as Caroline Milliken so poignantly sang, "Somewhere, over the rainbow, bluebirds fly. Birds fly over the rainbow. Why, oh why, can't I." Winging back and forth over the heads of the audience, then coming on stage to swirl around "Dorothy" and finally heading back out into the house to disappear, not to be seen again that night or any other night of "Wizard of Oz". At intermission, I overheard an audience member comment, "The stage effects are absolutely wonderful! The smoke and all... How do you suppose they trained that bird to come out and fly like that just for that song?" To which the reply came, "That wasn't a bird; that was a bat. Now if they could have timed it for the flying monkey scene that would have been awesome!" "Really? Oh my!" she exclaimed as she turned and looked fearfully up and over her shoulder. The bat may have missed its flying-monkey scene cue, but timed its appearance perfectly for a feature in the October issue of "The Viking".

I know a bit about birds, but not about bats other than Batman, Count Dracula and various vampire movies rented by my husband. Well, I do know that bats sleep hanging upside-down, they sleep during the day and come out at night; they fly using a kind of sonar; and they eat insects. Curious to discover more and figure out what bat was a theater buff, I turned to the Preble County Library, encyclopedias, and the internet. I found out some pretty cool stuff!

While bats are not birds, they are not rodents either. Bats are mammals - the only mammals in the world that actually fly! (Bat Facts from Wondrous Wyandotte Caves) Flying squirrels, for instance, don't really fly. They just glide from a high spot on one tree to a low spot on another. Unlike birds, bat wings do not have feathers. Unlike dragons, bat wings do not have scales. Instead, a thin, leather-like membrane extends from their bodies to each finger giving bats wings to fly. Interestingly, two-thirds of the over 1000 species of bats also use their "wings" like fishing nets to capture insects for food.

(Bat Conservation International, www.batcon.org) Bats are the fishermen of the night sky!

Yes, bats are mammals. They give live birth to helpless babies who drink milk from their mothers just as humans do. Called "pups", bat babies do not suck blood. Also according to Bat Conservation International, only 3 of the 1000+ species of bats worldwide are vampires and these are all in Central and South America, not in Transylvania, definitely not anywhere in North America much less in Ohio or Indiana or the Richmond Civic Theater. Even the Vampire Bats of Latin America do not attack humans. They make tiny bites on the legs of cattle, not hurting the cattle anymore than mosquitoes hurt us. Now mosquitoes, they do suck our blood. They are more vampiric than Vampire Bats 'cause Vampire Bats don't suck blood. That's right. Vampire Bats don't suck blood. They lap it up drop by drop like a kitten laps milk. (Interesting Bat Facts, Bats of Indiana State Parks & Reservoirs, Indiana Department of Natural Resources) To summarize, Vampire Bats do not exist in Transylvania; Vampire Bats do not suck blood; and Vampire Bats do not attack humans. The cattle that they do attack lose no more blood than a human does to a mosquito and those cattle do not suddenly turn into minions of Count Dracula any more than humans bitten by mosquitoes suddenly crave a Bloody Mary. In fact, according to Bat Conservation International, doctors use the anticoagulant in Vampire Bat saliva to treat human stroke victims and scientists are currently studying it as a possible better treatment for heart attacks. Vampire Bats are saving human lives. Imagine that!

Only 3 bat species are vampires; two-thirds eat insects. Bat Conservation International goes on to say about one percent of all bats are carnivorous, eating fish, mice and frogs. The remaining third feed on fruit and the nectar of plants. Yes, some bats are vegetarians, or fruitarians. Well, fruitarians are human fruit-eaters; animal fruit-eaters are technically frugivores. (Wikipedia.com) The one-third of bats that are frugivores reside mainly in Old World tropics and pollinate important plants much as bees do. Without bees, we would not have apples, for instance. Without frugivore bats pollinating flowers and dispersing seeds, we might not have bananas, avocados, dates, figs, mangos, cloves or cashews. (Indiana Department of Natural Resources) Bats are just as vital as bees in pollinating the foods we eat! I never knew that!

"Blind as a bat" so the saying goes. FALSE! Bats are not blind. Their eyes may be small, but they have "stereoscopic" vision the same as humans and can actually see better than humans do at night! (www.BatsAboutOurTown.com) Velly, velly interesting!

What about bats and rabies? According to the Ohio Department of Health, yes, bats are currently the animal most frequently tested positive for rabies in Ohio. Of the hundreds of bats they test, 6-25 positive results occur per year. Yet, no Ohioan has ever in recorded history contracted rabies from a bat. You see, when bats contract rabies, they do not turn ferocious like dogs and raccoons. Just the opposite, they become too sick to fly or feed and eventually too weak to roost, falling to the ground listless. Grounded bats are easily discovered and turned in for testing. Ferocious dogs and raccoons are not so easily captured. Even so, the incidence of rabies in raccoons is on the rise while that in bats is declining. The ODH expects raccoons will soon replace bats as the most frequent carriers of the disease in Ohio. Bats do have tiny teeth and will squeal and try to bite when picked up. While their teeth can break your skin, they are not of themselves capable of creating a serious wound. Still, if you see a bat lying on the ground, cute as it is, curious as you are, call the Wildlife Service to come get it. One human in the entire United States will die from bat-contracted rabies each year. You do not want to be that one.

I noticed that in most of the close-up pictures on the web, bats have their mouths open, teeth showing, looking mean and vicious. I knew that bats use some kind of sonar to maneuver at night the way whales and submarines do in the ocean. I didn't know that bats emit these ultrasonic sounds through their mouth and nose; therefore, bats always fly with their mouths open! (www.BatsAboutOurTown.com) Also interesting is that each bat species uses a different frequency range and has a characteristic call just like birds. Bat calls though are above 20,000 Hz, the highest pitch heard by the human ear. Anybody can buy the equipment scientists use to hear, track, and identify different species of bats. (www.BatsAboutOurTown.com) One device slows the speed and lowers the pitch of bat calls so people can hear them. Another records data from the calls, which can be downloaded onto the computer as wave files which are, in turn, converted into graphs. Bat census workers use such devices to follow bats and find their colonies. That is how we know that Indiana has had 12 and Ohio 13 different species of bats. They also learned bat habitats and habits. For instance, the Red Bat prefers to forage on the forest floor and roosts by day under the leaves on the forest floor. (www.nrsl.ttu.edu)

So what was the bat at the Richmond Civic Theater? Gee, I didn't have my binoculars around my neck while I was playing viola in the pit! The house lights were off and it was dark, too. Obviously, I cannot say definitively; however, after all this research, I bet it was a Big Brown Bat. According to many sources including Laura Jones of the ODNR (Ohio Outdoor Notebook, Oct. 2002) the Big Brown Bat (big for a bat, but only 4-5 inches long with a foot-wide wingspan) is the most common bat in

urban settings like the corner of 10th and Main in Richmond, IN. Big Brown Bats used to live in old growth forests, foraging insects near the tops of trees and roosting by day in hollow trees or underneath loose bark. With fewer old growth forests, they have adapted well to cities.

Now a large proportion take up summer residence under the eaves, behind window shutters or in attics of old buildings like the Richmond Civic Theater, hanging small and motionless from the rafters by day (usually 1-5 per structure), to emerge just before dusk when they are drawn to swarming insects around streetlights. If you happen to catch sight of one in binoculars, you would see long shiny dark brown fur covering the body with black on its face, ears and feet and black wing membranes. Big Browns are also the fastest bats. The Arizona-Sonora Desert Museum reports Big Browns have been clocked flying at 40 mph! Bats are the only major predators of night-flying insects, eating not only mosquitoes, but many forest and agricultural pests as well. Guano studies show Big Browns consume lots of June bugs, cucumber beetles, green stinkbugs, plant hoppers and leaf hoppers. In winter, they migrate to hibernate in caves and abandoned mines in southern OH and IN, as well as in KY and TN where winter temperatures are stable - cool but above freezing. (Laura Jones)

The Little Brown Bat at only 3 inches long with a wingspan of 8-10 inches is also common throughout Ohio and Indiana and is probably even more abundant than the Big Brown according to Dr. Jacqueline J. Belwood. (Life History Notes, Ohio Division of Wildlife) The Little Brown has rich brown, almost bronze, fur on its back and face with paler, grayish fur on its belly and dark brown wing membranes. While more abundant, it was probably not the bat in RCT. Little Browns feed over calm still water in ponds and lakes. Bats at Lakengren are probably Little Browns. Swallows eat insects above such water by day, Little Browns by night. Swooping, swerving, and dancing in the moonlight, Little Brown Bats scoop up caddis flies, mayflies, midges and mosquitoes. One Little Brown will eat up to 1,200 mosquitoes in one hour! (U.S. Dept. of Interior, Bureau of Land Come October, as temperatures steadily fall with the leaves and fewer insects fly around lights or above still water, insect-eating bats and birds alike gather to migrate to winter homes. Just prior to settling down for their long winter's nap, large numbers of bats visit the same spots every year to congregate and mate in a unique phenomenon called "swarming". Little Browns, Big Browns, Indians, Grays, Southeasterns and Pipistrelle Bats all commonly "swarm" in and out of cave and mine entrances without staying inside. (Indiana Dept. of Natural Resources) Dusk and dawn and during the full moon are the best times to view this ritual courtship dance. Far from the theatrical Halloween swarming to attack humans, the bats are much more interested in the opposite sex! Soon after they mate, bats settle down to hibernate just like bears, sleeping away the cold winter months when food is scarce. Pups are born in the spring.

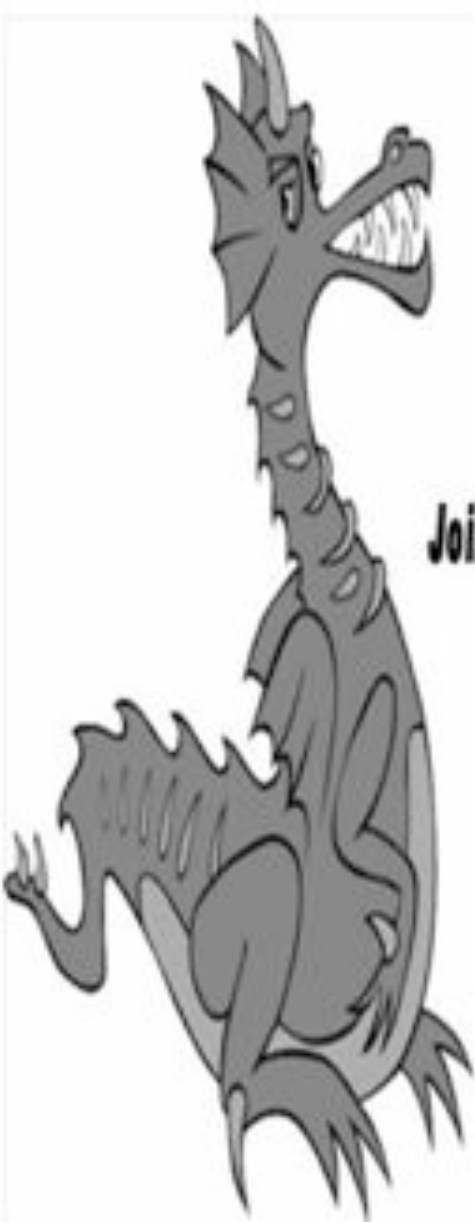
By the way, hibernating bats should not be disturbed. Their small bodies only store enough fat to survive one hibernation cycle. If awakened before insects are plentiful, they will die of starvation. That is why caves where bats are known to hibernate are closed to the public during winter. (Bat Facts from Wondrous Wyandotte Caves)

Forget the myths. Bats are not bad. Bats are good and valuable, necessary animals in the earth's ecosystem. Ohio and Indiana bats eat more mosquitoes than Purple Martins! Even Vampire Bats save human lives. So next time you put up a Martin house, why not put up a bat roosting box as well? Remember, bats are not after you to suck your blood; they are after those whiny winged mosquitoes that do suck your blood! (Laura Jones) Sipping a martini on your deck while watching ripples in the surface of the lake by moonlight will be so much more pleasant sans mosquitoes. Plus the silhouettes of those Little Brown Bats doing flips and sharp turns and all sorts of tricky flying maneuvers as they cast their winged "nets" through concentrations of congregating insects is cool to see.

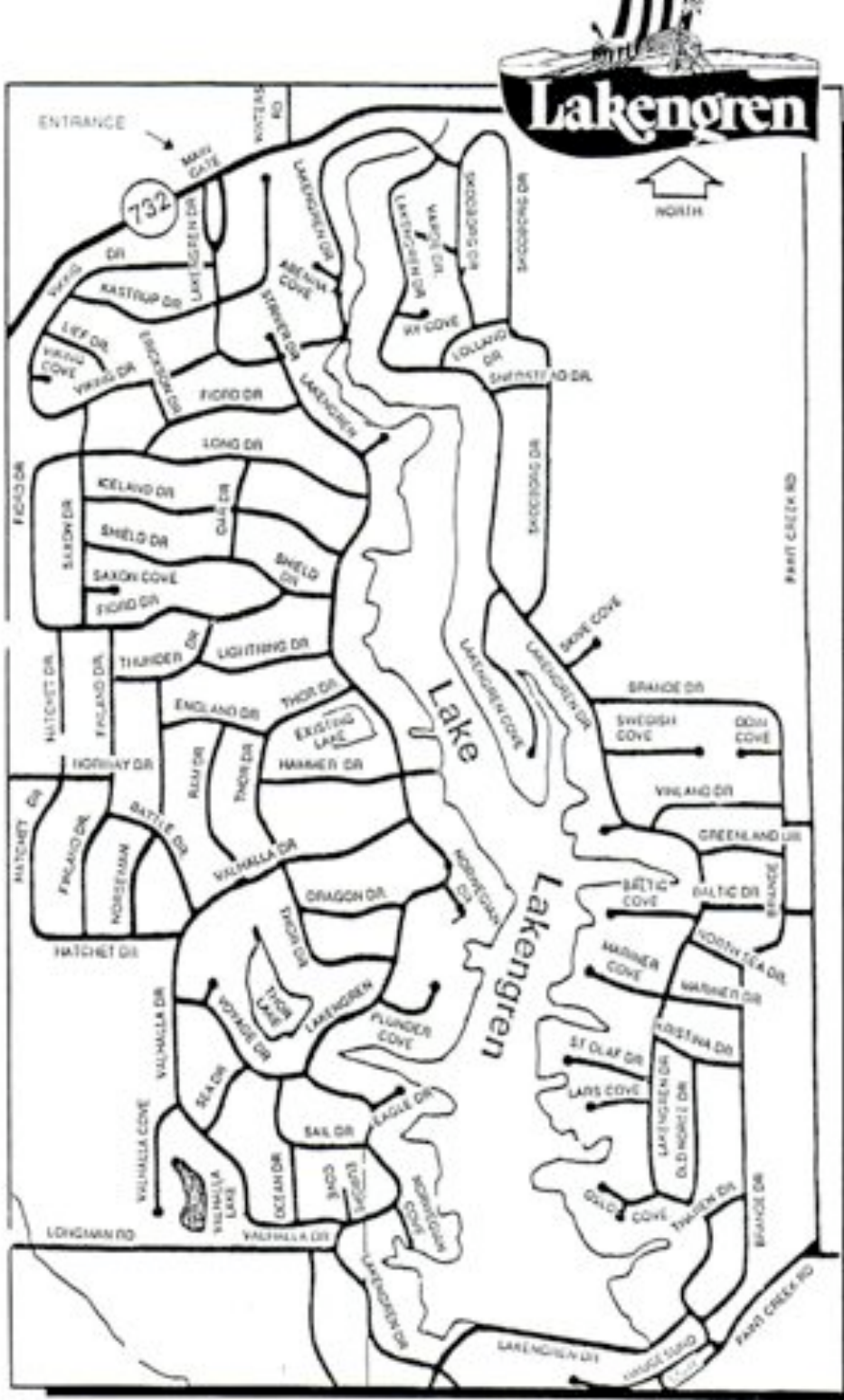
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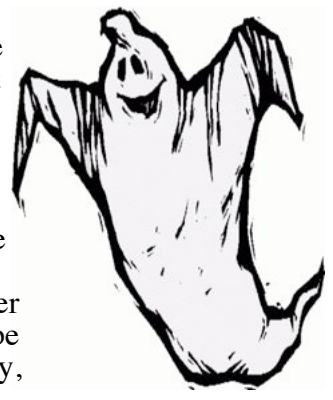

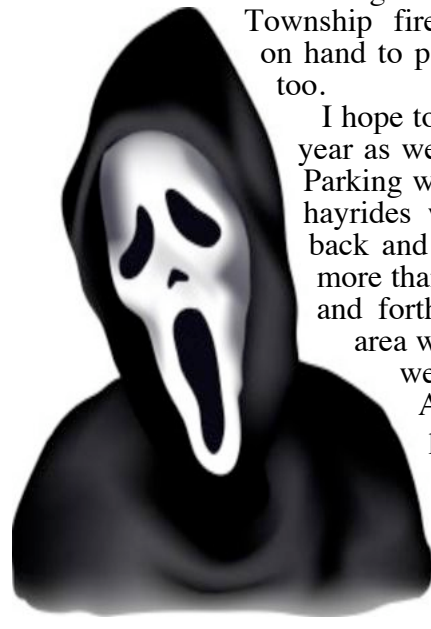
CHILDREN'S HALLOWEEN WALK

A Revised Lake Management Committee

At the Marine and Lake Management Committee meeting on September 2nd at the Marina, the following topics were discussed: the a history of the Lake Management along with the need to have some persons assist our Lake Manager, Kevin

Thorpe, checking our water quality; the business of buying minnows and game fish to stock our lake; and finalizing the fishing tournament dates.

Bruce Clark, who is president of the Bass Club, related that the Lake Management Committee was dropped on the Marine Committee when the previous Lake Management group dissolved. After discussion with input from Lakengren resident Karl Bergman, a waste management consultant, it was suggested that Lakengren residents be informed about the possibil-

ity of renewing the former Lake Management committee to assist Kevin in maintaining quality control of our lake water.

The blue algae of Grand Lake St. Mary's has precipitated this renewed interest. At that time, newspaper articles reported the blue algae in eight other Ohio lakes according to a study by Michael Vanni and Nicole Hayes, zoology professor and researcher respectively at Miami University, Oxford. Years ago, Miami University did a fish habitat study at Lakengren. Also, we have had contact with some of the board members of the Preble County Soil and Water Conservation Department. In fact, one of their five board members lives at Lakengren and could enhance our relationship with the local farmers in our watershed.
